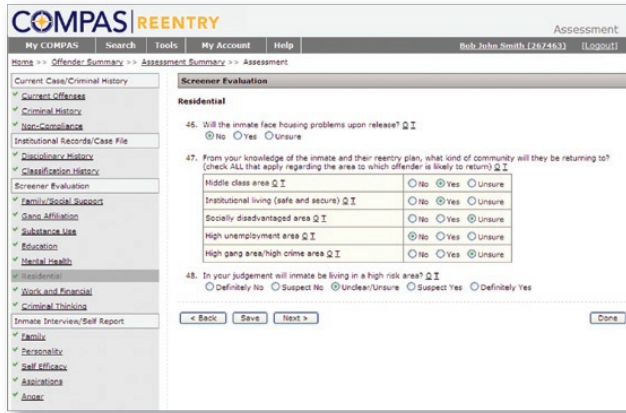

SCALES DEVELOPED SPECIFICALLY FOR REENTRY INMATE POPULATIONS

COMPAS Reentry includes criminogenic needs scales developed specifically for the longer term incarcerated inmate transitioning back into the community. Unlike traditional offender assessment tools focusing RETROSPECTIVELY on criminogenic needs in the community, COMPAS Reentry focuses the assessment on the inmate's PROSPECTIVE needs as they prepare to reenter the community.

OFFENDER TYPOLOGY ASSIGNMENTS

Northpointe's research team has found that there are common categories or "prototypical" male and female offender types that often re-appear in criminal justice agencies. These typologies are described in the software and the COMPAS assessment assigns offenders to their nearest prototype. Mainly explanatory and for treatment planning - the report assists in recognizing frequently recurring case-types you have often seen before (such as a "young streetwise gang member with repeated offenses; an older repeat drinking driver; or a "mental health offender"). In conjunction with the detailed main risk/need bar chart report, the typology assignment gives a "general direction" to assist in determining the best treatment and supervision plan for the offender's type.

High risk and often violent offenders - Socially deprivation - MH histories and Drug problems - High antisocial propensities (70% confidence)

- High risk violent offenders with drug and mental health issues
- Marginalized with high propensity for antisocial behavior

Criminal History and Substance Abuse: This prototype has high criminal involvement, high non-compliance and a history of violence and drugs; but only average for juvenile record and prison misconduct.

Social Resources: Most of these offenders reflect social deprivation and pessimistic expectations for release—e.g. housing problems, poverty, no support from families and social isolation on release. They have poor vocational and educational resources and high aimlessness.

Personal Factors: This profile reflects depression/mental health issues and high criminogenic personality—e.g. antisocial personality, low self-efficacy and low empathy.

Treatment Goals: This profile has multiple treatment goals—e.g. anger management, drug treatment, reduction in social exclusion and improvements in social bonding (housing issues, family support, improved financial resources, jobs, etc.). A mental health evaluation might be required. Finally, the personal domain is also criminogenic with personality and moral development concerns, suggesting the need for cognitive-behavioral intervention. This type will often require a tightly-structured intervention plan and the application of significant community resources.

Note: This is the "prototype" description of the closest category for this offender and each individual case usually has some differences from this prototype description.

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CASE SUPERVISION REVIEW

COMPAS Reentry automatically scores the instrument and recommends adjustments to the offender's current supervision level.
